**TOWN COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES**  
**TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 25, 2020 • 6:00 p.m.**

1. **CALL TO ORDER:** Mayor Hellyer called the regular meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Mayor Hellyer, Mayor Pro Tempore Scoles, Councilmembers Pellegrino, Drake, Dietrich, Holder, and Keating were in attendance. Others present Town Attorney Crosby; Town Administrator Pieper; and Town Clerk Sheri Medina.
2. **INVOCATION; PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE,**  
Invocation: Reverend Ward from the Timberlake Church gave the invocation  
Pledge of Allegiance: The Mayor led the Pledge of Allegiance
3. **PUBLIC HEARING** None
4. **MOTIONS RELATING TO AGENDA**
  - A. Councilmember Drake made a motion to add an update on the pier to the agenda. Councilmember Keating seconded. All voted in favor. **MOTION CARRIED.**
  - B. Also, Councilmember Drake, with respect to the approved department reorganization, feels the Council has an obligation to the residents, have a job to run the Town, we have a manager to get it done. There are times when communications are not being made between the residents and the Town Administrator. He thinks that the Council should hit the reset button and gather more information from the employees perspective and about the reorganization. He stated that he would like to see that employee back to work on Wednesday morning, also that the Council should be involved with the Town Administrator in any reorganization. We owe that to the residents, to the employees, and to the administration. Councilmember Drake made a motion to hit the reset button on the last decision Council gave the Town Administrator on reorganization. Town Attorney Crosby stated a motion for action is out of order because it is not on the agenda. Councilmember Drake asked how it can be worded to be able to bring that employee back to work. Town Attorney Crosby stated state law requires that the item has to be on the agenda with 24-hour public notice to be able to make a motion for action unless it is an emergency. Councilmember Drake feels this is an emergency. There are a lot of businesses needing answers. There are multi-million-dollar projects being delayed. Town Attorney Crosby stated 2/3 majority of Council would have to agree an emergency exists to add this to the agenda. Councilmember Drake made a motion to amend the agenda accordingly, Councilmember Keating seconded. Councilmember Pellegrino stated some ordinances will need to be reviewed to implement any reorganization, and it will be a long process. Councilmember Drake stated that if that is the case then we should be able to approve this motion since we will time to reconsider the reorganization. Councilmember Keating stated the critical part of the reconsideration is so that the employee can return to work so the operation of the Town and operate effectively and efficiently while the structure of any potential reorganization is evaluated through the multiple readings as Mr. Pellegrino stated. In the meantime, there will be at least another month before this is resolved. I don't think that is acceptable for the Town. Councilmember Pellegrino said there are two separate issues, it is the Administrators discretion as to when Mrs. Morris can be brought back to work. Mayor Hellyer asked for confirmation as to what ordinances would need to be changed. Councilmember Pellegrino acknowledge that needed to be

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53 evaluated as to what ordinances would be impacted. Mayor Hellyer, and Councilmembers Drake,  
54 and Keating voted in favor. Mayor Pro Tempore Scoles, Councilmembers Pellegrino, Holder, and  
55 Dietrich voted against. **MOTION DENIED**

57 **5. MINUTES APPROVAL**

62 Councilmember Keating stated first, it appears we've been given a new version of the January 28<sup>th</sup>  
63 minutes that we've not had an opportunity to review; and second, she feels there is too much liberty  
64 being taken to summarize the comments. Also, the minutes do not include Councilmember Keating's  
65 name as an attendee. We need to produce quality documents that represent this Town. Councilmember  
66 Scoles asked that everyone be a little patient and not be so critical. Our new clerk is doing the best  
67 she can. Councilmember Pellegrino stated that the Council should give more feedback to the Clerk so  
68 the minutes can be adjusted. Councilmember Keating stated that she has provided feedback in several  
69 different ways over the past few months only to have them ignored. These documents, as is, reflect  
70 poorly on this Town. Councilmember Drake made a motion to have the Clerk revise the minutes,  
71 Councilmember Keating seconded. Mayor Hellyer, and Councilmembers Drake, Keating, and Pellegrino  
72 voted in favor. Councilmembers Holder, Dietrich, and Scoles voted against. **MOTION CARRIED**

73  
74 **6. PUBLIC COMMENTS – Agenda Items only (3-minutes per speaker)**

75  
76 Mayor Hellyer made a statement to remind people to be respectful, and to inform the council of your  
77 opinions, and address them to the Mayor. Anyone out of order and that continues to be out of order,  
78 may be asked to leave.  
79

- 80 A. Al Kelley, 1216 N Dogwood Dr, stated that he is being sued by the Ex-Mayor of Surfside Beach.  
81 Councilmember Scoles called point of order that Mr. Kelley was using individual names. Mr. Kelly  
82 apologized and continued his statements regarding the inappropriateness of the ex-Mayor's  
83 interactions with the Town operations. Councilmember Dietrich also called a point of order that  
84 this time is for comments need to be directed at the Mayor and relating to the agenda, these topics  
85 are more appropriate for the comments section later on the agenda. Mr. Kelley said he thought  
86 there were no comments later on the agenda. Mr. Kelly tried to make additional points.  
87 Councilmember Scoles called a point of order for comments related to the agenda only. Mr. Kelly  
88 left the meeting.
- 89 B. Betty Lowery, 619 4th Ave North, asked about communications and public information. Mrs. Lowery  
90 asked what that means? Mayor Hellyer responded that we should be discussing the best method(s)  
91 for communication with the residents. Mrs. Lowery stated she is not on Facebook but has read  
92 the website and the Town's Facebook page. She found a rant on that page. Can parameters be  
93 put on what can be placed on the Town Facebook page? It isn't a free speech issue; we shouldn't  
94 provide the medium for this. Second, parking stickers. How do you identify the owner of a golf  
95 cart if there is not a sticker? How do you write a ticket? Councilmember Dietrich stated all golf carts  
96 have a state sticker, and the owner can be located based on the state sticker.
- 97 C. Mr. Hough Petree, 410 N Myrtle, had a suggestion, often golf carts have multiple town stickers on  
98 them. If would be difficult for parking enforcement to determine which of the parking stickers are  
99 valid. Make them a different color every year for easier enforcement.

101 **7. COMMUNICATIONS.**

102  
103 **A. Employee Awards**

- 104 i. Sargent Donald Sliker, Police Department, 15 years. An accommodation was presented by  
105 Mayor Hellyer. Sargent Sliker thanked the Council and the residents and has enjoyed working  
106 at Surfside Beach and feels like family and hopes to continue to serve.

111 **9. Discussion:**

112 A. **Public information** – Mayor Hellyer stated Facebook is not the place to be conducting Town  
113 business or for us to be involved in as elected officials. What are our alternatives? The Town has  
114 a website, a Facebook page, and a newsletter. But these have not been active. There needs to be  
115 a better way to communicate. We should consider the hiring of a Public Information Officer.  
116 Councilmember Keating suggested that there be a broader perspective considered. We need an  
117 overall strategy and vision for the Town on how we want to market the Town, how can we brand  
118 the Town. We talk about being the Family Beach, but what exactly are we doing that sets us apart  
119 as such. There’s a bigger issue with communication other than should we be on Facebook or issue  
120 a newsletter. A workshop or even a communication committee may be warranted to be able to  
121 discuss these avenues and evaluate the funds available. Funds are being spent that may be spent  
122 in a better fashion. A strategy needs to be in place to promote our Town and get more value for  
123 the funds that we’re spending. Consider this a marketing opportunity, we need to promote our  
124 Town in general and not piecemeal. Councilmember Pellegrino stated he agreed, and that he’s  
125 brought up every year during the budgeting process that there should be a designated person to  
126 keep up the website and to do the Facebook page and marketing. Social media is fine for  
127 conversation, but official Town information needs to be on the website. We need a person to focus  
128 on marketing our Town through the website. This item needs to be discussed during the budget  
129 process. Mayor Hellyer asked how do we do that because the information needs to get out to the  
130 residents. Councilmember Dietrich asked that his personal life be left to him, and the rest of council  
131 and employees, and allow the Council to do the job that needs to be done to better the Town.  
132 Councilmember Drake stated there might be a person in Town that may want to volunteer to  
133 promote Surfside Beach. We can use the experience of our Town residents for these purposes.  
134 Visitors come here and fall in love this with little town. We are fortunate to live here. The Town  
135 is spending almost \$200,000 a year with the Chamber, and maybe some of that money can be  
136 spent better. Councilmember Holder stated he feels everyone has made many great comments,  
137 and a workshop is to be able to have better communication. We need to make some short-term  
138 improvement and then look at the longer term. We need to work harder to have a plan.  
139 Councilmember Scoles also feels there should be better communication with the residents. She  
140 said that she has spoken to a few visitors that would not come back, and they mentioned the  
141 negative comments found online. She directed them to the Town website to get better information.  
142 Councilmember Scoles agrees that a workshop would be advantageous. The Town Administrator  
143 will set up a workshop.  
144

145 B. **Pier update** – Mr. Pieper said the plan revisions are complete. The Planning Department has  
146 approved them. The bid specs will be done by February 29 and submitted to the Town. Council  
147 can update the residents on the lease agreement negotiations. Mayor Hellyer confirmed that Collins  
148 Engineering will be issuing the bids, not the Town. At that point, the Council can set a date to put  
149 the bids out. Mayor Hellyer asked why the distribution of the bids needs to wait for conclusion of  
150 the lease negotiations. Town Administrator Pieper stated that this had been discussed and that  
151 we cannot hold the bids once published waiting for the negotiations to be completed. The Town  
152 Administrator still maintains that the lease negotiations need to be completed before issuance of  
153 the bid packages. Councilmember Keating asked as to when the bid packets will be going out. Mr.  
154 Pieper stated as soon as Council sets a date. Councilmember Drake said himself, Councilmember  
155 Pellegrino and the Mayor have been in negotiations with The Atlantic Restaurant Group (ARG). The  
156 talks are going well. There have been two meetings. The next meeting will be on Monday.  
157 Councilmember Scoles asked when Council could receive an update from the meetings with ARG.  
158 Councilmember Drake reiterated that the distribution of the bid packages need not wait for the  
159 lease negotiations. Councilmember Drake said an update can be given to the Council as soon as  
160 Tuesday. Councilmember Dietrich thanked all Councilmembers with the work with negotiations,

161 but he doesn't agree to continue these negotiations. Councilmember Dietrich feels we should sever  
162 the relationship. Councilmember Drake stated the relationship seems to have changed and the  
163 talks with Mr. Howard are going well. Councilmember Keating said there are two options – to  
164 breach the agreement or consider continued negotiations, a lot of consideration needs to go into  
165 the outcome with the Atlantic Restaurant Group. We need to consider what is right for the Town.  
166 With all the other expenses associated with this project, are we prepared to spend additional \$2 -  
167 \$3M to breach this agreement. With negotiations going well, hopefully, an agreement will be  
168 reached, which is in the best interest of everyone involved.

169  
170 **10. BUSINESS**

171  
172 **A. Second Reading of Ordinance #20 – 0908 – An Ordinance to Amend Chapter 9 MOTOR**  
173 **VEHICLES AND TRAFFIC.** Councilmember Pellegrino stated this is the second reading to change  
174 Ordinance #20-0908, to change the designation on Yaupon Drive, making it open parking.  
175 Councilmember Keating discussed the content of the Ordinance, there are some copy/paste issues,  
176 and the WHEREAS clauses need to better reflect why these amendments are being put forward.  
177 Mrs. Keating supports the Ordinances, yet they need to be revised before signature.  
178 Councilmember Scoles asked the Town Attorney for clarification. Town Attorney Crosby stated,  
179 whereas' are just recitals, and they can be changed. Councilmember Drake asked the Town  
180 Attorney to pencil in these corrections and simplifications, this is confusing and need to be  
181 simplified. The Town Attorney indicated that the recitals are not codified so they can say whatever  
182 Council determines. Councilmember Pellegrino made a motion to adopt the second reading of  
183 Ordinance #20-0908 to amend section 9-16(f). Councilmember Scoles seconded. All voted in favor.  
184 **MOTION CARRIED.**

185  
186 **B. Second Reading of Ordinance #20 – 0912 An Ordinance to Amend Chapter 4, BUSINESS**  
187 **LICENSES, PERMITS.** Director King stated the second reading of this Ordinance is to make  
188 updates to bring the Town into compliance as recommended by the MASC. Councilmember Keating  
189 moved to adopt the Second reading of Ordinance #20-0908 predicated on the attachments to be  
190 included with the final document. Councilmember Dietrich seconded. All voted in favor. **MOTION**  
191 **CARRIED**

192  
193 **C. Second Reading of Ordinance #20 - 0914 An Ordinance to Amend-Chapter 14 [FLOOD**  
194 **DAMAGE PREVENTION CODE] SECTION 14-17(5) REGARDING GAS CONTAINERS.**  
195 Councilmember Scoles stated at the first reading she had asked questions concerning the strapping.  
196 Specifics on strapping was provided by Director Morris before the last meeting but has not been  
197 added to the Ordinance. Also, Councilmember Scoles asked would this change affect the Town's  
198 CRS rating? The answer she received from Director Morris was not definitive. She feels this is  
199 unacceptable. Councilmember Pellegrino stated that he asked this question at the first meeting and  
200 it was confirmed that with the appropriate anchoring and strapping that is already in the fire code  
201 that the CRS would not be affected. Councilmember Drake further explained the strapping  
202 requirements are stipulated elsewhere and would not be superseded by the ordinance.  
203 Councilmember Scoles required these stipulations be restated in this ordinance. Councilmember  
204 Dietrich concurred. Town Attorney Crosby stated the information could be added to the Ordinance  
205 before the vote and incorporated into the motion. Councilmember Drake asked to see the amended  
206 language to assure that the language is not something unique to only Surfside Beach.  
207 Councilmember Scoles moved to adopt the Second reading of Ordinance #20-0914 as amended.  
208 Councilmember Dietrich seconded. Mayor Hellyer and Councilmembers Dietrich, Drake, Holder,  
209 Pellegrino, and Scoles voted in favor. Councilmember Keating voted against. **MOTION CARRIED.**  
210 Councilmember Keating made a statement that it is clear that a few councilmembers have  
211 information that the rest did not, nor have we had a chance to review such additional information.  
212 We cannot allow this to happen.

214 **D. Second Reading of Ordinance #20 – 0915 An Ordinance to Amend Chapter 2,**  
215 **ADMINISTRATION TO ADDRESS APPEARANCE OF CITIZENS AND REGULAR MEETING**  
216 **TIMES.** Councilmember Drake moved to adopt the Second reading of Ordinance #20-0915 to give  
217 back the residents their voice. Councilmember Keating seconded. Councilmember Keating spoke  
218 again about the inappropriate recitals in this Ordinance, and quality documentation. The entire  
219 Ordinance should be reviewed at another meeting. Councilmember Drake appealed to the Town  
220 Administrator to fix these things. Councilmember Drake made a motion to accept the amendment,  
221 Councilmember Keating seconded. Mayor Hellyer and Councilmembers Dietrich, Drake, Holder,  
222 Keating, and Pellegrino voted in favor. Councilmember Scoles voted against. **MOTION CARRIED.**  
223 Town Attorney Crosby stipulated that the original motion to accept the second reading of the  
224 ordinance needs to be voted, since the first vote was only on the amendment. Mayor Hellyer and  
225 Councilmembers Drake, Holder, and Keating voted in favor. Councilmembers Scoles and Dietrich  
226 voted against. **MOTION CARRIED.**  
227

228 **E. Appointment of Certified Flood Plain Manager**  
229

230 Councilmember Dietrich moved to appoint Mitch Combs as Flood Plain Manager. Councilmember  
231 Pellegrino seconded. Councilmember Dietrich stated there is an employee in the Town who is  
232 certified beyond just Flood Plain management since 1995, and has the documentation in front of  
233 him. The Town needs to move this along; someone needs to be in place. Councilmember Drake  
234 asked to have the information on the appointee that Councilmember Dietrich had before the  
235 meeting. Councilmember Scoles stated the Mayor had this information and this was a previous  
236 conversation between the Mayor, the Town Administrator, and herself. Councilmember Drake said  
237 all information should be submitted to all Councilmembers before having to take a vote. We've  
238 seen this issue before – every single package needs to be the same. Councilmember Scoles  
239 stipulated that the individuals of Council need to do their own homework and get whatever  
240 information they need on the agenda items. The Town Administrator stated that personnel  
241 information would not be included in the packaged and that Mr. Dietrich requested this information  
242 late that day. Councilmember Drake stressed that any item could wait if all the councilmembers  
243 did not have the same information. We should not expect people the vote on items for which they  
244 don't have the same information. Councilmember Keating said she recommends that this should  
245 be tabled until further research is done. Also, to find out precisely what the reorganization looks  
246 like. This is just another thing that appears to be snuck through. We need to see how this fits  
247 within the new reorganization before making these reappointments. Councilmember Pellegrino  
248 stated that there is always information not included in the packets and we have to go dig for  
249 clarifications. The Town Administrator explained in detail in executive session what the  
250 restructuring would consist of, Council has an understanding of what it will look like. It is the  
251 responsibility of the Councilmember to reach out and research data. Councilmember Scoles asked  
252 that this be moved forward. Mayor Hellyer made a statement that he expressed his desire to have  
253 the E-district reviewed and we need that to move on. All of a sudden, everything turns, Planning  
254 & Zoning is gone, some of use are left out of the loop, and now things are being done without  
255 transparency, and feels this is just not fair. Councilmembers Dietrich, Holder, Pellegrino, and Scoles  
256 voted in favor. Mayor Hellyer and Councilmembers Drake, and Keating voted against. **MOTION**  
257 **CARRIED.**  
258

259 **11. RESOLUTIONS - NONE**  
260

261 **12. PUBLIC COMMENTS – Town Services or Business Conducted** (3 minutes per speaker)  
262

263 A. Patricia Magliette,104 Harbor Lights Drive, Ralph Magliette, sat on this board. Every week he would  
264 review his packet thoroughly. Every councilmember and the mayor are to have the same  
265 information in that packet. He also did follow up with questions. It is unfair for someone to have  
266 to vote if all information is not provided. The process is that the Mayor and Council directed the  
267 town manager, not the other way around. The packets were not complete tonight. We have bad

268 memories of the 22 amendments that were not in the packets. That jeopardized our flood  
269 insurance. This Council, our elected officials, is to work for the residents, and you tell the Town  
270 Administration what we want. We could have used Ms. Morris here tonight because she is the  
271 Flood Plain expert.

272 B. Bernie Wharton, 21 S Myrtle Drive, If you run for public office, your background and personal life  
273 then becomes public. If you don't like that, you should get out of office. Also, what is the benefit  
274 of restructuring? What is the cost avoidance? That is what we need to know before changes are  
275 made.

276 C. Al Lauer, 124 Harbor Lights Drive. There were several Ordinances up for discussion that should  
277 have gone to the Planning Commission before presented to Council. Now the Planning Director is  
278 suspended. That is a mistake. She is very knowledgeable of all of our ordinances, and she's been  
279 absent in this process. These things going on behind closed door, the fact the everybody does not  
280 have the same information, is shameful. We're not getting transparency right now, and it's clear  
281 who is working against it. The residents deserve to hear the truth.

282 D. Betty Lowery, 619 4th Ave North, Please, speak to DOT about installing signs stating not golf carts  
283 on Highway 17. It is very dangerous and state law. The Town needs to delete the Facebook  
284 account, or we need a Facebook manager to determine what should be posted.

285 E. Tabitha Mull, 413 13th Ave North, Chairwoman for KSBB, Invited everyone to come out to the  
286 festival (BBQ Festival), March 14. It would be great to see all of the Council to attend. KSBB will  
287 start up the yard of the month soon. In May, the Beach Sweep will start. Join KSBB Facebook  
288 page.

289 F. Diana Taylor, 715 7th Ave North, the speed limit between Bypass 17 and Business 17 on Glens  
290 Bay Road is 30 mph. The speed limit on the road by my house of 30 mph. Do they compare?  
291 There is only one stop light to access to the post office, and part of the frontage road has been  
292 closed since the road construction. As a result, people are cutting through parking lots. How does  
293 any of this make sense?

294 G. Dean Sizemore, The bid packets are due on February 29th. Are we open on Saturday to receive  
295 them?

296 H Terry Lauer, 124 Harbor Lights Blvd, I agree with what Mayor Hellyer said. The residents voted on  
297 what was stated during your campaign – that you would be transparent. Tonight you have proven  
298 yourselves wrong – 4 of you have proved yourselves wrong. Transparency is when everyone has  
299 the same thing. I'm disappointed in the vote tonight. The residents deserve better. Think about  
300 what you are doing.

301 I. Lynn Manchester, 1022 N Ocean Blvd. What has happened to the Planning & Zoning Director is  
302 wrong. The Town Attorney interrupted to say personnel matters are out of order in these  
303 comments. Town Administrator also restated that he did what the Council had voted on to  
304 restructure. Ms. Manchester continues that it's just sad that these permits are being pushed  
305 through. The Planning & Zoning Director saved the residents with the E District. The Council voted  
306 for Mr. Combs without all the information, you didn't have the same information as Councilmember  
307 Dietrich had – that's scary.

308 J. Name Unidentified, resident and taxpayer residing at 722 7th Ave North, the municode does not  
309 require that I state my name, Only has to give address. It also does not say that I have to only  
310 address the Mayor. There are now 2 Flood Plain Managers in this Town. John Adair is a Flood Plain  
311 Manager. Thank you for what you're doing, Council, you are doing a good job.

312  
313 **13. TOWN COUNCIL DISCUSSION AND/OR COMMENTS** (3 minutes per speaker)

314  
315 A. Councilmember Scoles, Thank you to all residents for coming out. I want to state that there was  
316 not any other information in my packet that everyone else did not have. The information Director  
317 Morris submitted to me before the meeting was information that she had worked on and that she  
318 was going to include the ordinance. It was not included. Have a good evening.

319 B. Councilmember Holder, Tonight has been a long night with a lot of emotions. Happy that Council  
320 is going to have a workshop to discuss communication. The training in Columbia showed me that  
321 our Town is behind. Thank you to everyone for coming.

- 322 C. Councilmember Keating, I would like to see a couple things placed on the agenda for March 10,  
323 2020, meeting, on January 28<sup>th</sup> we deferred an ordinance amendment for Chapter 17 to a  
324 workshop, I would like to see the totality of Chapter 17 to be reviewed. This way, all necessary  
325 changes can be made. Also, Chapter 2 needs to be on the agenda so that revisions can be made,  
326 whether or not as a workshop. Also, I would like to see monthly department report outs back on  
327 the agenda. They can be split between the two meetings per month. Communication needs to  
328 improve. If Facebook communicates with most residents – so bit it – it is 2020. We need to get  
329 our newsletter re-established. We need another workshop for the bigger strategic vision for this  
330 Town. There are probably residents who would be interested in helping out. Thank you for coming  
331 out, and I appreciate the comments.
- 332 D. Councilmember Drake, Thank you to everyone for coming out and being patient with us. For the  
333 Family Beach – we have a lot of work to do. We can do better. Everyone needs the same  
334 information to make decisions. The E District needs to go back to the Planning Commission. We  
335 need to be up front to conduct our business. I would like to see the Town grow. We need to get  
336 our information out. Facebook is out there; we need to accept it. Let’s get the positive information  
337 out there to overwhelm any negative comments. I look forward to going to the BBQ festival.  
338 Thanks to everyone for coming out.
- 339 E. Councilman Pellegrino, It is nice to see everyone interested in our Town. Flood Plain Manager, you  
340 all saw that on the agenda, we all knew it was Mr. Combs that we were looking to appoint. I did  
341 not have the information, but I made calls and did the research. You have to find the information  
342 for yourself. Everyone is blaming the administrator, but there was a 7-0 vote to restructure. He is  
343 not the person to blame. Council is making the decisions. I represent all taxpayers, residents,  
344 second homeowners, businesses, and tourists not just permanent residents. I take all the  
345 information and make the decision that is best for the Town. Thank you for the input, I appreciate  
346 all input. Have a great night.
- 347 F. Councilmember Dietrich, asked Chief Hofmann to stand. I have the most utmost respect for you

349 recollection of what happened. The police had no information. Thank you to Mr. Pieper and Mrs.  
350 King for everything. We do the best we can. Mr. Hucks, if want to play with me again I suggest  
351 you call me.
- 352 G. Mayor Hellyer, I am the mayor and I’ve been elected to represent the residents. That’s what I am  
353 going to do. I will work aggressively to get things done for the residents of Surfside Beach and  
354 their best interests. Thank you to everyone for coming out.
