TOWN COUNCIL
REGULAR MEETING MINUTES

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1. **CALL TO ORDER**

Mayor Deaton called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. Mayor Deaton, Mayor Pro Tem Truett and Councilmembers Blair, Johnson, Martin, Samples and Childs were present. A quorum was present. Staff present: Administrator Booth; Clerk Pinnell, Police Chief Christenson, Fire Chief Packard, Public Works Director Taylor, Special Events Coordinator Ellis and Finance Treasurer Hursey. Attorney Mr. Smith was also present.

2. **INVOCATION and PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE.**

Pastor Julian Riddle of Surfside Presbyterian Church said the invocation and Mayor Deaton led the pledge of allegiance.

3. **AGENDA APPROVAL**

Mr. Truett made a motion to approve the agenda as submitted. Mr. Childs seconded the motion. Mr. Samples made a motion to amend the motion to amend the agenda to add item 7E discussion of financial transparency to the Town of Surfside Beach website under Business. Mr. Martin seconded the motion. **All voted in favor of the amendment. MOTION CARRIED. All voted in favor of the approval of the agenda as amended. MOTION CARRIED.**

4. **MINUTES APPROVAL**

Mr. Samples made a motion to approve the minutes from the June 9, 2009 meeting as submitted. Mr. Martin seconded the motion. **All voted in favor. MOTION CARRIED.**

5. **PUBLIC COMMENTS – Agenda Items only – 3 minutes per speaker**

There were no public comments.

6. **COMMUNICATIONS**

A. ***Recognition: Rone Rutledge, 30 years service***

Mr. Rone Rutledge was recognized for 30 years of service with a plaque and a check.

B. ***Finance Report***

Mr. Booth reported on the two months revenues for the year. Tourists are coming in and the town is collecting a little more money from the parking meters and Mr. Booth added that he anticipates meter revenues to increase. This is a dedicated fund which is not tax payer's money; this fund paid for the Yaupon Parking lot. The town will rebuild this fund to pay for additional purchases in the future. The auditors have completed their review and they will bring forward their report to council soon. Mr. Samples stated that he noted that the adjustments made at the last meeting are reflected in the budget; the numbers reflect increases that were rolled over into the next year. Mr. Booth stated that the projects were started in the previous year but not completed until the current year. Mr. Samples stated that he also noted that in the line in the enterprise funds with net change to assets he would like an explanation at the next meeting as to what the balance was in terms of total assets since this is a

52 relatively new line. Mr. Booth stated that there is a difference between assets which
53 are the value of the property and or money in reserve. Mr. Samples stated that it
54 looks as if the income statement is mixed with the balance sheet; he spoke with the
55 Finance Director about this and he understands why the town is doing this but feels it
56 would be helpful to explain. Mr. Booth stated that the town is under GASB and
57 many requirements regarding accounting. Mr. Samples stated that the general fund
58 capital equipment line where there are large credits represents out of fund balances.
59 Ms. Hursey stated that this was the enterprise fund. Mr. Booth stated that in the
60 general fund it is not seen except to the extent of a decrease in the fund balance
61 which is not normally reflected on the monthly financial report.

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63 **C. Public Works Report**

64 Mr. Booth reported that underneath the pier is being enclosed so that the police
65 beach vehicles can be stored and so there would be easy access. Electric will be put
66 in; no gasoline will be stored there. Projects are being finished up. The town will go
67 into a planning phase. Mr. Booth stated that he would present the plan at the next
68 council meeting. Mr. Johnson had a question regarding a constant flow of water
69 coming from the pier. Mr. Booth stated that this is ice water from a cooler at the pier
70 and will be diverted away from that area.

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72 **D. Recreation Report**

73 Mr. Booth reported that the Sun Fun Super Saturday was a great event and the town
74 is getting ready for the 4th of July celebration. There would be a planning meeting
75 the following week to go over details for the day. Parking would be a problem. It
76 was confirmed by Ms. Ellis that the pier parking lot would be closed and Mr. Booth
77 stated that Yaupon parking lot would be open. Mr. Booth stated that the town would
78 need to see if the fireworks display would slow individuals from lighting their own.
79 Mr. Booth stated that there are concerns regarding the cost of the fireworks but he
80 feels that it is important for the town to have these types of events; they bring in
81 tourists. Mr. Johnson asked if the town received some sponsorship and Mr. Booth
82 answered that it did receive some monetary sponsorship. Mr. Johnson asked about
83 the concession trailer set up at Martin Park and asked if it was run by the town. Ms.
84 Ellis stated that the concession stand at Huckabee is leased out and this trailer
85 belongs to the leasees; there is no actual concession stand set up at Martin Field so
86 they are using the trailer as a stand. Mr. Booth stated that the County will be
87 assisting to pay to build a concession stand at Martin Park. It was confirmed that the
88 town receives funds for the concession lease.

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90 **E. Administrator's Report**

91 **i. Town Planning Studies**

92 Mr. Booth reported that the council will receive a proposal from DDC to
93 perform a number of town studies. One needed study to be paid for out of the
94 parking meter funds would be a parking study. The town has great beaches
95 and facilities but the parking is something that needs to be addressed. The
96 paid parking areas help to pay for the facilities and beach cleaning. There is
97 also a need for a study on the downtown area of Surfside along with the pier
98 area. The studies will bring the town to its next phase. Mr. Booth stated that
99 there is a grant that the town is applying for to pay for the fire station; it is
100 part of the stimulus funds. Mr. Johnson asked how much funding was

101 available. Mr. Booth stated that the town would be looking for 2.2 million
102 for its shovel ready project.

104 **ii. Stormwater Education**

105 Mr. Booth reported that he will need to inform the public one by one
106 regarding the town ditches. There has been a change in maintenance of the
107 ditches over the past few years. The town used to take a backhoe and clear
108 them and now per stormwater requirements the town has allowed the
109 vegetation to grow. The town realizes that there is much of the public that is
110 unaware of the stormwater permit requirements. Mr. Booth reported that he
111 received a petition from some residents to remove vegetation from a ditch
112 which made him realize that many people were uninformed. The town will
113 allow the middle of the ditches to grow vegetation; this helps filter the water.
114 Mayor Deaton stated that this is a federally unfunded mandate and is part of
115 the best management practices for stormwater. The town is required by
116 federal law to maintain best management practices; this is part of the
117 stormwater and clean water act. Mr. Childs stated that he attended
118 conferences at Clemson University four years ago and at that time they were
119 informing the public to allow the vegetation to grow to help filter the water
120 and he brought this back to the town at that time and he is glad to see that the
121 town is now following this procedure. Mayor Deaton stated that the town is
122 ahead of the curve regarding stormwater. The stormwater plan was
123 implemented in 2001 and the town is a model for other beachside
124 communities. The town is now in the education phase. Mayor Deaton
125 instructed the public in attendance to get informed and to call the town hall
126 for additional information.

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128 **iii. Mosquito Spraying**

129 Mr. Booth reported that the town is spraying twice a week for mosquitoes.
130 The chemical being used is not as strong as what was used 20 or 10 years
131 ago. The town needs to use a safer chemical and it is not as affective towards
132 the ridding of mosquitoes. The town places donut tablets in the water to kill
133 the larvae. Mr. Booth stated that rainy seasons bring many of the mosquitoes
134 and suggested that the public spray themselves as well. Mr. Samples stated
135 that when the town sprays they should make sure that they go at the regulated
136 speed for spraying; if they are going over 25 miles per hour the spraying does
137 not work. Mr. Samples stated that it takes approximately 2 days and 2 nights
138 to cover the entire town. Ms. Blair stated that Ms. Donevant is taking
139 complaints of foreclosure properties with pools where stagnant water would
140 be the perfect breeding ground for mosquitoes. The State is working with the
141 municipalities to put mosquito dunks in these pools without trespassing. This
142 is a public health issue and needs to be taken care of and staff is taking these
143 complaints and is stocking up on the donuts to rid the mosquito larvae. Ms.
144 Blair stated that she has been assigned a testing on mosquitoes and will
145 inform the public on any findings of West Nile virus if ever found.

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147 Mr. Booth reported that a few years ago there were very few frogs and now
148 the frog population has increased which shows that the ecology is coming
149 back.

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iv. Beaches

Mr. Booth reported that the beaches are looking good. They are being cleaned and they attract many visitors. Mr. Booth stated that the town is taking care of any tents left by individuals overnight on the beach; they become a danger during high tide. It was confirmed that the canopies/tents are being tagged if left behind. Ms. Blair asked if the beaches have received any damage due to high tides with the new moon. Mr. Booth stated that the town has seen a little erosion but no damage. There have also been a few Loggerhead turtle nests reported in the beaches in town.

7. BUSINESS

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A. *First Reading #09-0675: Amendment to Parking/Meter Ordinance*

Mr. Booth reported that once the parking study is performed a more comprehensive parking ordinance will be presented to council. This ordinance is being changed to address the infractions issue previously passed. Mr. Childs made a motion to adopt first reading of ordinance 09-0675 amendment to parking/meter infraction. Ms. Blair seconded the motion. It was confirmed that the times of operation would be posted on all of the pay areas. **All voted in favor. MOTION CARRIED.**

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B. *Proclamation #09-68: Public Safety Awareness Day*

Clerk Pinnell read the proclamation. Mr. Samples made a motion to approve proclamation 09-68. Mr. Martin seconded the motion. **All voted in favor. MOTION CARRIED.**

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C. *Decision Paper: Town Engineer*

Mr. Booth stated that he needs to draw up contracts with two engineers. The town already has a contract with Earthworks and now he would like approval from council to enter into a contract with DDC Engineers. Mr. Martin made a motion to approve the administrator to initiate a contract with DDC Engineering. Mr. Truett seconded the motion. Mr. Samples stated that DDC rates are much higher than Earthworks and asked if the town has adequately budgeted for the work that the administrator anticipates going to DDC. Mr. Booth agreed that the rates are different. Earthworks would be used for stormwater and other projects and the town would be using DDC for planning and grant writing. Mr. Booth stated that the scope of work and planning studies will be brought to council since these projects are not budgeted. **All voted in favor. MOTION CARRIED.**

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D. *Discussion on 1 Percent Sales Tax*

Mr. Samples initiated the discussion. Mr. Samples stated that the City of Myrtle Beach adopted the local option tourism development fee also known as the 1 penny sales tax. The Town of Surfside Beach is not Myrtle Beach and Myrtle Beach has come a long way and while doing so has accumulated a lot of debt. Mr. Samples stated that the benefit to vote on the sales tax is that if the town was ever to elect to have a local option tourism development fee it would have to go to the voters to approve. Mr. Samples stated that “until we don’t pass it, seven people can decide one way or another whether a sales tax, one penny sales tax, would go into effect in

194 the Surfside Beach municipality". Mr. Samples stated that he is not in favor of the
195 sales tax adding that he would like the council to go on the record regarding this
196 issue. Mr. Martin stated that sometimes it is better to not do anything, if some future
197 council decides they need this tax then that would be their decision and this council
198 has not requested that this be brought up except for tonight as a discussion item and
199 no one has put forward to propose implementing such a tax. Mr. Truett stated that
200 Surfside is not Myrtle Beach; the town has three motels and its demographics are not
201 the same and he does not feel that this burden should be placed on the citizens of
202 Surfside Beach adding that this is nothing against the Chamber. The stimulus money
203 has been accepted and has come to SC from Washington; the Chamber now has
204 received appropriated funds which they originally thought they would not receive.
205 Mr. Truett stated that he does not feel this sales tax is appropriate for Surfside Beach.
206 Mr. Johnson stated that he agrees and does not feel that the one percent sales tax is
207 something the town needs at this point in time nor does he feel that the town council
208 should vote on it; it should go to the voters if the subject was brought up but at this
209 time there is no need. Mr. Childs stated that he agrees that any time there is a tax
210 like this the citizens should vote on it; not council. Ms. Blair stated that she does not
211 support the sales tax; it would need to come to a vote with the citizens.

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213 Mayor Deaton stated that Surfside Beach has changed a lot; density and excessive
214 building has been addressed, many homes were built and now the town needs to fill
215 those homes and revenue streams are few and far between. Accommodations tax
216 and hospitality fees are what the town depends upon, the 100 to 120 day window of
217 opportunity is there for the town to fill the houses and bring the tourists into Surfside
218 Beach and the town is aggressively marketing Surfside and feels that the town would
219 be premature to make any decisions on this sales tax issue at this time. The council
220 has not been presented any research to see what the effect the sales tax would have
221 on the community and there may be opportunity in the future for a revenue stream
222 that the town may need badly since the town does depend upon tourism. The Mayor
223 stated that he would hate to shut any doors at this point in time since no information
224 or numbers has been presented to council to decide whether it could be a wash, a
225 windfall or a lose/lose situation. Mayor Deaton stated that he feels that it is
226 premature to ask council to vote on anything concerning the sales tax and that he
227 agrees that a referendum would probably be the best way to go with the sales tax
228 issue and would not want to see council vote on this issue tonight. Mr. Samples
229 stated that he appreciates all of the comments. Mr. Samples stated that many people
230 are on fixed incomes and there is already an 8 percent sales tax in Horry County; the
231 rest of South Carolina is at 5 percent and he feels that it is presumptuous of town
232 council to levy another 1 percent sales tax that would hurt the retailers. Mayor
233 Deaton stressed that no one on council has proposed a one percent sales tax.

234 **E. *Discussion on Financial Transparency***

235 Mr. Samples stated that there are approximately 6 cities in South Carolina that use
236 their website to post transaction registers. These registers are made available to the
237 public to show where their money is going; payroll is not included. Mr. Samples
238 stated that this is government transparency and he feels the town can provide this
239 especially with all of the technology now available. Mr. Martin stated that it is his
240 understanding that this would not be a difficult thing to implement and asked for
241 staffs' opinion. Ms. Hursey stated that most of the websites she went on that

242 provided this service downloaded their data from their financial software and created
243 a PDF (portable data file) which is the most basic; one town had an internet fiche
244 system which was very involved. Ms. Hursey stated that it would not be difficult for
245 the town to post PDF files to its website. Mr. Booth stated that when citizens request
246 information with the Freedom of Information Act that takes time to research the
247 public will need to pay for the staff members' time. Mr. Booth agreed with having
248 transparency adding that the town and staff has nothing to hide. The budget is often
249 changed but items are brought to council; the budget is a projection and many things
250 come up during a year that cannot be anticipated. There was a question regarding
251 whether this should be in the form of an ordinance and the attorney recommended
252 that this should be implemented by ordinance. Mr. Martin made a motion to direct
253 staff to bring forth an ordinance providing the capability to provide posting of check
254 transactions. Mr. Truett seconded the motion. Mr. Samples questioned the need
255 for an ordinance. Mr. Smith stated that the town would need to look into the level of
256 information that would be delivered via posting on the website. There are many
257 other issues to consider such as refunds in the criminal court system; the town would
258 be dealing with some sensitive information. There was a further discussion
259 regarding needs for ordinances and why one was not needed for a contract for the
260 engineer. Mr. Samples stated that he feels that the town is making it more difficult
261 than it needs to be and added that he has full confidence in the Finance Director in
262 printing acceptable information. Mr. Truett stated that checks are key coded and if an
263 individual wanted to pull up a check they could check the key code to receive more
264 information on how money was spent. **All voted in favor. MOTION CARRIED.**
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266 8. PUBLIC COMMENTS

267 *Trudy Elliot, 1411 Highway 17:* "I try to come to all of the council meetings as it is the
268 only public forum that the people who live in Surfside have. I just wanted to say that I
269 feel like that I represent a lot of people that I know on what they wanted me to say. First
270 of all Surfside has a golden opportunity with the way that things are going on now down
271 in Myrtle Beach and I really feel like you all are missing the boat. First and foremost I
272 know personally of four businesses that are looking elsewhere to move away from
273 Surfside. This is without a doubt the most unfriendly and uncooperative town as far as
274 business is concerned that I've ever dealt with and I've had stores in other states but I've
275 never received the attitude that I get from Surfside which is probably why a lot of the
276 stores are moving away and going down to Garden City. If you ride to Surfside pier on
277 Friday night or even on Saturday night, it is dead. If you go down to Garden City it is
278 very busy. You will see people walking and walking down to Garden City and nobody
279 is walking to Surfside, the two weekends I have personally checked it myself. Why?
280 You need to rethink lots of your rules and regulations. You also need to have some very
281 family friendly places to visit. You all were much more concerned with banning
282 smoking than helping the businesses make money and having customers. This council
283 has the power and the money to do almost anything they want to do. Where are benches
284 for old folks like myself to sit on near or around the pier at night? Where are kiosks for
285 people just to browse through? Where are some kids rides? There's absolutely nothing
286 to draw families to the pier in Surfside at night. You have very little attendance at your
287 council meetings. Why? Nobody feels they can get anywhere. That's kind of how I
288 feel too. I talked to a couple of business owners on and around the pier. They all said
289 the same thing, it's a waste of time going to council; they don't do anything and we have
290 repercussions if we go stand up and have something to say. Nobody really cares and

291 nobody will listen. How many have you been out and talk to the people who helped vote
292 you into the council? Do you really care? There is time to do something. Starting at the
293 top and working down. You're running people away but then you don't know because
294 you all aren't out there asking around, talking to the people. Believe it or not I really do
295 care about this beach. I want it to be great; I want it to be known throughout the east
296 coast as the best beach to go to. I have a business here and I want the tourists' dollars,
297 that's why I'm in business. Nobody works for just the fun of it. Many of the customers
298 that I had tell me all the time, next time they come here they will be staying in Garden
299 City because there's things to do. You may be planting flowers, putting utilities
300 underground, making lots of unfair rules, stopping tourists unfairly, providing no
301 entertainment for our guests and locals. There's no wonder that people will go to
302 Garden City to live and stay on vacation and you will lose more and more businesses.
303 Please change. Please. I've had a business for 3 years and not a single person on this
304 council has been to my business to thank me for choosing Surfside to open a business,
305 you know, they just want me to pay my taxes, keep my mouth shut and just keep paying
306 the permit for whatever I need. You have no idea what I'm doing and obviously no one
307 seems to care. Tonight we heard loud and clear from the council 'sometimes it's best to
308 do nothing at all', I guess that kind of sums up the way the council feels. Thank you
309 very much. "

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311 9. COUNCIL COMMENTS

312 *Mr. Childs:* "I really disagree with the young lady that was just up here. This Mayor
313 and council is really trying hard to get a lot of activities going in town. We just recently
314 formed a special events committee along with the Chamber who is with us in that
315 committee and we're meeting often and we're coming up with ideas. I want to give the
316 Mayor a lot of credit for our last Sun Fun. It was the first time we ever had any Sun Fun
317 Festival as big as it was on Saturday and I talked with the Mayor and there's a few
318 things we can change next year to make it bigger and better and I expect to see a lot of
319 things going on in town and we're going just as fast as we can, the administrator is doing
320 things as fast as he can, sometimes he's going too fast, but he's really doing what he can
321 and this council is behind him 100 percent and I think you're going to see a lot of
322 changes and we are business friendly. There's going to be things that fall through the
323 cracks but if you bring them up to us I really, honestly, believe that we can work those
324 problems out and talking about seeing people around town and talking to them. I'm on
325 the street all of the time and you'd be surprised how few people you see outside of your
326 house, unless you go knock on a door, so I do try to talk to the people in town and see
327 what their complaints are as I'm sure the rest of this council does too. I see them at
328 events, talking with people; the Mayor's always getting input and we really are trying
329 very hard and I expect in the next few years you'll be very pleased at the number of
330 events and the tourist friendly things that we have planned, so give us a little time, we'll
331 get it."

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333 *Mr. Samples:* "Well, thanks for coming out. I just say there's always room for
334 improvement."

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336 *Mr. Truett:* "We have, starting Sunday, an event at the pier which will be on the west
337 side if any of you were at the car show, there was a stage set up as you walk up the ramp
338 to the pier, right on the left, there will be three gentlemen playing acoustic guitars. There
339 will be a stage set up, tents from 2 to 4 every Sunday through Labor Day and like Mr.

340 Childs said we have this new committee; we've asked for ideas on the website and on
341 Facebook; we're meeting every two weeks trying to promote new events on the beach;
342 just trying to gather information so I urge you guys, we have a meeting Thursday, please
343 come, if you've got any ideas contact myself and Mr. Childs or anyone on this
344 committee because we are just thriving for information. What do you want to see?
345 What kind of entertainment can this town provide and I agree with Mr. Childs, we are
346 going in a different direction and we are trying very hard and please be patient with us.
347 Thank you."

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349 *Mr. Johnson:* "Good evening ladies and gentlemen. Thank you for coming out. Thank
350 you for staff in attendance. We are Surfside Beach, a family beach and we are trying to
351 improve all aspects of the town and I will see you out on the golf cart, every night, just
352 as usual. Thank you."

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354 *Ms. Blair:* "Are you ready for some fireworks? It's hard to believe it's almost July 4th
355 already but it will be a big event and I just wanted to restate what my colleagues have
356 said. We've heard these complaints and we've heard these issues and the
357 encouragement from a lot of you that you want more activities and you want more
358 friendly events going on, that we can gather as a town and welcome our visitors to join
359 us and enjoy those summer events and this committee is working very hard, but things
360 don't happen overnight; it takes time to develop those contacts and time to plan and time
361 to gel as a committee and come together and work together and they are throwing around
362 all sorts of ideas from jazz festivals to blue grass and barbeque and all sorts of things that
363 they're hoping to pull together, now, they may not all happen this season but we need
364 them to be year round; we want gatherings all the time and I can tell you that the music
365 to accompany the fireworks is being done and recorded at my home and so if you need
366 to get into the spirit of things, once again, you can come on by and listen because I have
367 it going there all the time with getting ready for the 4th of July, so everybody come out
368 and enjoy what we are putting together and what is offered to you now and send in those
369 ideas and come to the meetings and help us plan. Help us work to get these events going
370 and if you're out and about and you see any of our public safety officers, hopefully
371 they're not stopping you for doing anything wrong or answering any calls at your home
372 but if you see them outside, it is public safety day, remember what they do and
373 remember that they're there for us all the time and we put a lot of dependence in them
374 and take them for granted and we know that when we need them they'll be there, so just
375 remember to give them a good thank you and lift up a prayer for them on Friday for
376 putting their lives on the line all the time. Thank you for coming out. Have a great week
377 and a great 4th. I hope to see you all on the beach for the fireworks."

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379 *Mr. Childs:* "Mr. Rutledge I want to congratulate you on your years of service with the
380 town. Thank you again but one more thing Mr. Mayor. I want to point out a thank you
381 for making our festivities last week such a success by working with the Chamber. It was
382 a great success and I just want to give you credit for self organizing that."

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384 *Mr. Martin:* "I noticed Mr. Rutledge you did stay for the whole meeting. Thank you
385 very much. We really do appreciate your years of service to the town and I know I've
386 seen you many times going past the house and I always give you a wave. I appreciate
387 your friendliness as well as your professionalism. Thank you."

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Mayor Deaton: “Well, it is a new day in Surfside and we have changed gears and we’re moving forward on a lot of fronts. I alluded earlier, to the fact that we have all of these beautiful homes on the beachfront as opposed to hotels or motels or concrete boxes. We are truly a family beach. We have these houses that will hold maybe three families with seven bedrooms, five bathrooms and our tourists are only here about 100 days, 120 days so we enjoy this community for 200 plus days as residents with no tourism and because of this tourism income we have the perfect infra-structure. We have the ability to come here and spend millions of dollars on stormwater improvements; we have the ability to create an environment that’s very unusual on the South Carolina coast. Mr. Booth mentioned earlier our Blue Wave designation which we just received and we’re one of only two beaches on the entire coast of South Carolina that has that designation. It has to do with habitat and it has to do with water quality, it has to do with beach access, it has to do with a lot of components that makes this a special place and so thank you for coming. Thank you for what you do, committees are very important, please get involved with our committees because this council, we actually utilize our committees as far as major work goes. When it gets to us the works already been done, we’re decision makers and so these committees are out there doing all this work; they’re out there bi-weekly or weekly and they produce some great things. The mural is one example of that, the beautification committee came up with that idea and has implemented that; that’s just one example of what residents can do if they get involved so thank you for being here; thank you for coming and you all have a good evening.”

10. ADJOURNMENT

Mr. Truett made a motion to adjourn. Mr. Johnson seconded the motion. **All voted in favor. MOTION CARRIED.** The meeting was adjourned at 7:35 PM.

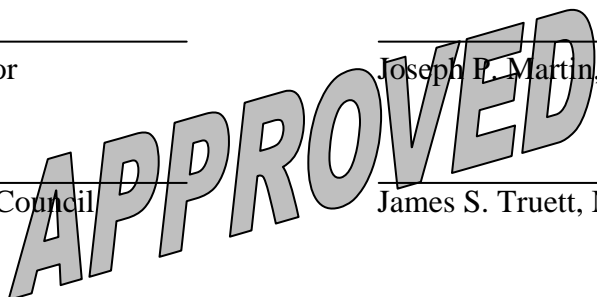
